- Apples have vitamin C. Vitamin C helps keep us healthy by supporting our immune system. Share with children: Vitamin C helps our bodies fight sickness.
- In Wisconsin, apples are typically ripening and ready to pick in late August through October.

taste testing

Gather three or four different types of Wisconsin apples for children to try. Choose varieties with different skin colors and sizes. Some favorite Wisconsin apples include Gala, McIntosh, Golden Delicious, Honey Crisp, and Cortland. Wash the apples under cold running water, dry, and cut into slices. Give children a variety of apples to try and ask which apple slice makes the loudest crunch. You can also roast apple slices in the oven for a different flavor and sensory experience. Toss apple slices with oil or unsalted butter and bake at 350°F until soft.



planting

Apples grow into trees from seeds or from a technique called grafting, where a branch of one apple tree is attached to another tree. Grafting allows farmers to experiment with growing different varieties of apples. Growing apples requires planting more than one variety for pollination. You also need patience because apple trees take four or five years to produce their first fruit!

harvesting

Apple harvest occurs in the fall. When selecting apples that are already picked, choose firm, shiny, smoothskinned apples with intact stems. Apples should smell fresh, not musty.
